- 1) Lynn Skrukrud, Co-Founder of NEO, gave a presentation about their planned Youth Center and about NEO in general.
- 2) Jay Lowden, President and CEO of the YMCA of Superior California, spoke about possibly expanding their program into Nevada County. The YMCA focuses on 3 main goals: youth development; healthy living; social responsibility. They will be conducting a Community Needs Assessment. Their survey will be sent out through the Community Support Network.

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3:55-4:40 Meeting Focus: Emergency Needs and Holiday Programs for Families

- Lieutenant Reyna Salcido and Vicki Winters with The Salvation Army: Over 500 families received services in 2012. They are always in need of people to sponsor needy families. They work with Toys for Tots, Women of Worth, Nevada County Sheriff's Department and others. Their red collection kettles are their main fundraiser of the year. They are the clearinghouse for families so that there's no duplication of services. See: grassvalleysalarmy.org.
- Kristen McGrew, County Coordinator for Safe Schools Healthy Students and PARTNERS Family Resource Centers: All 3 FRCs are connected with schools. Emergency needs are available through them: clothes closets; the Diaper Project; car seats, Children's Behavioral Health referrals, and referrals and connections to may of the other agencies including DVSAC, WOW, Child Advocates, CalWorks, IFM and the Food Bank. In addition, a food pantry, laundry services and firewood are available at the San Juan Ridge FRC. This FRC is also collaborating with the Salvation Army to serve as the site for sign-up and pick-up of Christmas baskets for families on the Ridge. - Lynn Woerner, Executive Director of KARE Crisis Nursery: They provide respite to children ages 0-5 and are available for supervised visits. - Sue Vanson, Executive Director of Interfaith Food Ministries: IFM has been in existence for 26 years. Over 400 volunteers which serve over 3000 families. They recently acquired a new building at 440 Henderson Street, to open early 2014. For the holidays, they will have a drive-thru food distribution. Thanksgiving dates: 11/20, 11/22 & 11/25. Chickens, turkeys and all the trimmings. Christmas dates: 12/18, 11/20, and 11/23. 10:00 a.m.-1:00 p.m. In order to receive holiday food distribution, recipients must be a registered client of IFM. Registration occurs at 551 Whiting Street and clients must show proof of residency in Nevada County and a Social Security card for each person receiving food. - Jennifer Morrill, Administrative Assistant for the Food Bank of Nevada County: They
 work with 22 partner agencies. Distribute at 15 schools. Turkey distribution on

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- Craig Phillips, Executive Director of Sierra Nevada Children's Services: SNCS has been in existence for 35 years. Their Children's Community Chest provides discretionary funding as a last resort for children's needs. Few requirements but must have a demonstrated need. - Debbie Daniel, Administrative Services Officer with Nevada County Health and Human Services Agency: Project GO offers free energy conservation help and utility payment assistance for low-income individuals and families. Call 1-800-655-7705 for weatherization and 1-888-524-5705 for utility assistance. The County can also help provide funding for small home repair projects to low-income homeowners. Q: Does SNCS help out with transportation needs?

A: Yes. Some.

Q: Do all funds collected in the red kettles remain local?

A: Yes. Funds remain in Nevada County. Also, children may volunteer to collect if accompanied by an adult.

Q: Which Counties are included in the YMCA of Superior California?

A: Nevada, Sacramento, Yolo, Yuba, Colusa, Sutter, Butte, El Dorado and Placer.
