<u>Meeting Focus</u> – *School Safety.* Presenter Christine Espedal, Safety and School Climate Coordinator for the Nevada County Superintendent of Schools (NCSOS). Handout will be posted on CSN website "Meetings" page. Following are some key points from Chris's presentation.

- Types of school violence: verbal and physical threats, and bullying
- What contributes to school violence: home environment, mental/physical health, weapons, stress & anxiety, media, abuse, group effect, sports & teams, gang-related, lack of services, no guidance in difficulties, bullying
- Offender profiles there is no one profile. Types of behavior some of the things we look for: non-stop video game playing, impulsive, speech (talk of plan), loner
- What can we do?

Emergency Management Institute Training

Collaborative meeting with first responders and school administration

Comprehensive school safety plans - site specific, incident specific; training of staff and students (CERT team training); practice - drills; know the resources on your campus and in your county; BE the eyes, ears, and mouth of your campus; know your environment, know your staff, know your students

• Need to know what each agency, etc means by terminology, e.g. "shelter in place" can mean different things to different agencies.

- **Relationships** are the key to preventing school violence.
- "Lessons learned" is how we make changes in protocols. Alert, inform as event unfolds in real time; risk and threat assessments can only be effective if we KNOW our students; relationships are essential.
- Know your environment. Parking lot; lockers; class room; common areas; cafeteria; theater, library, office; outside area fields, stadium, gyms, locker rooms; know the 2-mile radius of your school what happens & where. Bus routes, malls, theaters; don't be complacent!
- Know your staff who are your co-workers; who is your support staff; who comes on campus; how are staff identified; volunteers; supervision/extra duty; good days/bad days. Sign in and sign out when visiting school campuses (accountability...if building collapses who do we need to search for?)
- Know your students recognize early warning signs.
- New word: "Isonnection" connected (online) but completely isolated. Can be, do, or design whatever s/he wants in the online environment.
- We viewed a short video about lessons learned from Sandy Hook (ABC News report)
- Some of the Warning signs: violent content in personal writing or artwork; a pattern of bullying; intolerance or prejudice; drug or alcohol abuse; gang activity
- Relationships can change outcomes
- Another short video about empathy..."if you had knowledge of their experiences"
- Building relationships establishing goodwill: can help minimize classroom disruptions; improve student engagement; reduce stress for everyone; protect the student's self-esteem
- In conclusion changing trends related to school violence requires us to: know our environment; know our staff; know our students
- All these things can be taken off school campuses to: workplace, home, places you travel
