What would you like colleagues in the community to know and understand about your organization?: Pillowcase Project (grades 3-5): inspired by university students carrying their belongings in pillowcases in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, project was developed in partnership Disney. Follows a Learn, Practice, Share model and meets many Common Core standards. Aims are to increase awareness and understanding of natural hazards. In a one hour classroom session, led by trained volunteers, students learn emotional coping skills, best ways to stay safe, and how to create their own emergency supply kits containing essential items in a self-decorated pillowcase, then encouraged to share with friends and family. || Red Cross Clubs (K-12 and college): Emphasizes community service. Provides students with knowledge and life-saving skills to help prepare their school and community to respond to emergencies and opportunities to develop leadership skills while making a meaningful impact by addressing community needs. organization?: Developed by the YMCA in Santa Clara County under banner of ProjectCornerstone.org 10+ years ago. 40 Asset based and now in 25+ school districts in SC County, plus some in Sacramento, San Mateo, other counties. Surveys have documented increase in # of assets in youth in schools with the program. (Increased assets->increased healthy, decreased high risk behaviors). Model program: lesson plans; activities; uses parent volunteers, a lead per school, a reader for each classroom; 8 books for kindergarten; 24 books/ 3 years (1/school month); all grade 1-8 students learn and practice moral of the monthly book. A slightly altered pilot program started in January 2017 at Grizzly Hill School.

<u>What would you like colleagues in the community to know and understand about your</u> <u>organization?</u>: Beginning this fall, we will be running small group discussion opportunities for parents based on the five protective factors called Parent Cafés. These dynamic groups are parentdriven and support parent leadership development at all levels. We will be collaborating with Sierra Nevada Children's Services to host these 6-meeting sessions (held every other week) that will include child care and food for participants; we have funding to offer transportation and funding to offer stipends to parents who serve as Table Hosts for the discussions. All of this is funded through Public Health by a federal grant called Project LAUNCH.

Current Collaborations &/or Opportunities or Desires for Collaboration: Knowing that word of mouth and personal experience are the two best parent recruitment tools, we are looking to hold sample "Pop-Up Cafés" this summer in places where parents are already gathering. We'd love to hear about it. What would you like colleagues in the community to know and understand about your organization?: The "Transforming the Culture of Violence" Project

We see it as a tool. A tool for awareness, for transformation, and for communication with the practical application of becoming better able to treat myself and others as I would like to be treated. We further believe that those who take this on can actually begin shifting what is "normal" in their culture with their transformed attitudes and behaviors. Participants in this project could then take these transformed attitudes and behaviors into the future to create conditions where children, communities, organizations, and nations live with far less dominance and violence than they experience now.

The Project has three parts:

1. Considerations: Deconstructing the Culture of Dominance / the Culture of Violence - Five Ways to Dominate / Traumatize Others and Ourselves:

- Not Seen
- Not Heard
- Not "Mattered"
- Not Included
- Not Empowered

Seven Distinct Forms of Control, Coercion, Violence and their Associated Traumas:

- Gender Role
- Subordinative Role
- Attitudinal
- Verbal
- Physical
- Sexual
- Ideological/Institutional/Financial

A Sequence of Control, Coercion and Violence: Seven Steps in a Trauma-Producing Event:

- Establish My Image of Authority
- Authority Denied/Defied
- Death of My Image of Authority
- Choose to Re-Establish My Image of Authority
- Objectify Whoever Denies/Defies My Authority
- Chase Whoever Denies/Defies My Authority
- Coerce/Control/Traumatize Whoever Denies/Defies My Authority using one or a combination of the Seven Distinct Forms Control, Coercion, Violence to Re-Establish My Image of Authority

2. Transformations: How can I begin ceasing dominating and perpetuating the forms of control, coercion, violence I have learned to perform as Post-Traumatic Mental and Physical Adaptive Patterns?

3. Communications: How can I begin to step out of the System of Dominance to communicate in non-dominating ways, producing less trauma and more constructive collaborations?

organization?: Our free program helps English speaking adults improve their reading and writing skills by matching them, one-on-one, with volunteer tutors with whom they meet weekly for 1-2 hours at a time and location for their convenience.

Research has shown that children of parents with low literacy skills are likely to enter school with neither the language nor the pre-reading skills needed to succeed at literacy acquisition, nor the motivation to practice reading. Conversely, parents who frequently ask their children questions and respond to the questions the children ask, who provide a print-rich environment, read to their children, who demonstrate reading's ability to solve problems and make reading an enjoyable experience, are helping their children develop strong oral language skills and preparing them for learning how to read in school.

What would you like colleagues in the community to know and understand about your organization?: The Friendship Club's (TFC) mission is to engage, empower and educate girls at risk. It is a free comprehensive, long-term, year-round prevention program for girls after school, during school breaks and in the summer, that provides intensive social and emotional support and helps build important life skills for them to grow up confident and successful. The program staff are all professionals led by the Program Director who is a credentialed teacher and has her Doctorate of Education degree. Girls typically start the summer before 6th grade and stay in the program with their cohort until they graduate high school (7 years). This helps them build strong ties and healthy relationships with each other, the staff, the volunteers that support program activities, and the mentors they are matched with. All TFC activities focus on building girls' strengths and incorporating one of our six impact areas of Health and Wellness, Self-Awareness, Goal Setting, Self-Sufficiency, Healthy Relationships, and Community Connectedness. TFC also provides academic support through homework help and one-to-one tutoring for girls struggling academically in school, helps prepare them for college through the College Knowledge program, and provides for some basic needs by taking them clothes, shoes, and school supply shopping, providing them with nutritious home-cooked meals every time they are with us, and helping their families apply/connect to needed services such as CalFresh, affordable/transitional housing, medical insurance, mental health care, and drug rehabilitation. Girls are referred to The Friendship Club by school staff, local behavioral therapists and other nonprofit organizations using our online referral form. TFC interviews the girls and the parents/guardians to make sure that the girls want to be in The Friendship Club, the parents/guardians are supportive of their participation, the girls are a good fit, and that they are committed to attending regularly.

Current Collaborations &/or Opportunities or Desires for Collaboration: TFC works closely with Nevada County Behavioral Health, Public Health and Social Services, as well as other nonprofits providing services that our families often need: DVSAC, WOW, Food Bank/Interfaith Food Ministries, CoRR, Salvation Army etc. Although TFC collaborates some with other youth-serving organizations, such as NEO, Gold Country YMCA, Big Brothers Big Sisters and Child Advocates, it is interested in exploring more opportunities for collaboration with these and other nonprofits. We are particularly interested in working with other youth serving organizations to educate our community about each organization's unique contributions to youth development and to dispel any myths that we duplicate services and compete for donor dollars. The needs of our youth are far reaching and no single organization can meet those needs alone—we all need to work together to extend our reach into the youth community and ensure that we are collaborating and complimenting each other.

What would you like colleagues in the community to know and understand about your

organization?: The Young Parents Program of Nevada County provides case management services to expectant and parenting teens, both male and female that reside in Nevada County. It is a voluntary program that can enroll expectant or parenting youth up until the day before their 19th birthday. Youth can remain enrolled and receive services from the program until they reach their 19th birthday **and** have been in the program for 24 months. Visits are scheduled twice a month and can happen in a variety of setting with home visits every quarter. The purpose of the Young Parents Program is to address the social, health, educational, and economic consequences of adolescent pregnancy and child bearing by providing comprehensive case management services to expectant and parenting teens and their children. The Young Parents Program emphasizes Positive Youth Development, which essentially is a curriculum focusing on and building upon the adolescents' strengths and resources. A major role of the program is assisting the youth and their children in accessing appropriate services, Social Services, Substance Abuse Intervention, Mental Health Services, Parenting Education, Health Education,

Domestic/Relationship Violence, Legal Assistance, Employment Opportunities, Housing Assistance, Nutrition Counseling, Oral Health. Transportation is available and provided to the young parents to support access to resources, appointments, and other important obligations.

Currently, the Young Parents Program has lost the state funding that has kept the program running for many years. The current finding will end June 30, 2017. We are attempting community outreach in the hopes of coming up with ideas and other funding options to keep the program going. Anyone interested in helping can contact the Case Manager at the number listed above.

Cal-Learn follows the Young Parents Program model however, Cal-Learn is a mandatory program for expectant and parenting teens who receive CalWORKS/TANF. The goal of the program is to help the young parents graduate from high school. Cal-Learn provides cash bonuses for good grades and can also help with childcare expenses, transportation expenses, and school expenses. Although Cal-Learn and the Young Parents Program share a Case Manager, they are separate programs with separate funding streams. Therefore, Cal-Learn is not affected by the Young Parents Program funding cuts. **Current Collaborations &/or Opportunities or Desires for Collaboration:** The Young Parents Program/Cal-Learn currently has MOU's and/or collaboration agreements with Public Health, FTHB, Head Start, WSMC and WIC. The Case Manager is a member of the CSN-CAPC Board, the Breastfeeding Coalition Council of Nevada County, and the Childcare Coordinating Council of Nevada County. Desired collaborations would be with any and all agencies working with youth as well as young adults, parents and families.
