Meeting Focus – Connecting Point: An Interactive Overview.

Presenters from Connecting Point: Executive Director Ann Guerra, Communications Manager Heather Heckler, and Professional Skills Trainer Lisa Dorman

Ann Guerra and Heather Heckler provided an overview of Connecting Point (CP). See more info on website: connectingpoint.org.

CP has three main programs: Home Care, Employment Services (serving CalWORKs participants), and 211. In addition, there are some Special Programs.

Home Care

Home Care program (IHSS or In-Home Supportive Services) plays an essential role in keeping seniors and people with disabilities with low income living in the community instead of a nursing home. CP connects seniors and people with disabilities to qualified caregivers. The program manages paperwork, payroll, and more, and provides trainings. CP has partnerships with Sierra Nevada Memorial Hospital for classes on diabetes education, living well with chronic conditions, and quitting smoking.

Employment Services

CP's Employment Services are for participants in the CalWORKs program and Child Support Services. The goal is to get people into sustainable careers. The program provides career counseling, navigation (identifying and navigating barriers to employment), training, and work experience.

211 Connecting Point

211 (or 877-847-0499) is a number to call to be connected with a huge range of resources in the community. It's free, confidential, and available 24/7. www.211connectingpoint.org. In addition to serving callers, 211 serves as a community resource hub with its database of hundreds of programs.

Special Programs

• Ready to Grow - a First 5 program for families with children 0-5 that connects them to resources to support health and development

- Market Money financial assistance for purchasing fresh food at local farmer's markets
- Senior Assistance Line connects seniors with a wide array of resources
- Transportation Assistance provides information on local and regional transportation including trainings on how to use the bus system and help with trip planning
- Coordinated Entry entry point for people experiencing a housing crisis in Nevada and Placer Counties

• Community Call Center - CP can help organizations get their message out and serve as a registrar for an organization's events. Organizations can ask data questions and enroll people in some programs. Examples: Coordinated entry, CodeRED, AARP tax appointments, (smoking) Quit Kits.

Future Projects

- Volunteer coordination hub
- Expansion of employment services

Lisa Dorman facilitated a teamwork activity.

What kinds of things affect teamwork?

Communication, Personalities, Opinions, Agendas, Values, Leadership, Different reasons for being there, Not speaking up, Situation overtaken by events - things happen

What else keeps teams from being successful?

Resources - time, money, materials; Skills of team members; Lack of clarity for having the team; Lack of participation

Each team of four picked a leader. There were small paper bags on each table which contained spaghetti, and large and small marshmallows. Teams were given 15 minutes to create the tallest free-standing structure possible. The leader could physically participate, but only offer verbal instructions. Fun and laughter ensued.

Things learned from the activity

A strong foundation is the key; Need good communication; Cooperation; Collaboration; Need the right resources and tools; Mutual respect; Supportive comments and encouragement; Need the right people with the right skills; Goals and strategies; Effective decision-making; Trust; Effective leadership; Optimism. - wanted to return to rock climbing
- had shop skills, tried to make his own prosthetics in dad's shop
- wanted to make something of his life to honor rescuer who died
- got advanced degrees at MIT and Harvard in mechanical engineering and biophysics
- now a leader in prosthetic design
