Nevada County Office of Emergency Services

Jeff shared information geared toward preparing families for disaster preparedness. OES is working to share the same message across multiple presentations so that all community members have the same information.

Code Red

OES will use Code Red to share emergencies that are happening in specific areas. Individuals can sign up for

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voice and/or text through MyNevadaCounty.com. Connecting Point can help those who don't have access to the internet.

2 types of notifications from Code Red:

-Emergency notifications – everyone signed up for Code Red receives these

-General notifications – everyone signed up for Code Red can opt in

Note: Enter Code Red number as a contact to get around the Do Not Disturb function on your cell phone

Ready, Set, Go

Now is the time to get Ready, with egress plan, emergency contacts, Go Bag, etc.

Get Set: be ready to act when red flag conditions exist, expect the power to get cut

Go: Earlier the better, implement your evacuation plan and tune into trusted news

Questions:

-some questions about access to evacuation routes

-requested to have information in other languages

-Noted a drill happening this Sunday for firefighters, etc. concentrated on Firewise communities (AreYouFireSafe.com)

-Important to video a walk through of your home that records your belongings, etc.

Nevada County Superintendent of Schools office

Chris and Jeff have been working together on community safety planning. Schools can be the safest place to be and tie into safety protocol and emergency preparedness across the community.

-Community Emergency Response Team is a county-wide program within schools – teams of Teens at multiple schools receive 22 hours of training and are tested in simulated scenarios. Students can now act as support and be resources for helping the community, continuing to look at improvements to

-Provisions for special needs kids evacuation? Teen members/Aides from CERT are “buddied up” with students with disabilities at Nevada Union High School.

-Discussed power outages impact on those who rely on electronic health equipment – PG&E is developing a plan. Insurance companies can be good source of support for individuals who need a plan.

YubaNet

For organizations working with kids – suggest having children help program information into cell phones for older family members, etc. Kids need their own Go Bag. Involve kids in emergency planning.

Drills are for everyone – practice, practice, practice, and all will become more comfortable.

Media coverage – social media adds to the rumor mill, and the professional media works hard to counter rumors. The local media agencies work together to put out the accurate information as quickly as possible.

YubaNet uses a time stamp to help identify the most current news items. If your agency has news to contribute, contact your news agency to share and amplify messages through their platforms.

Network Announcements and Meeting Evaluation – Partners may make short announcements about upcoming events/programs. Attendees complete meeting evaluation forms and leave in designated box at back of meeting room.

-Nevada County Public Health: medical emergency shelters are required to have 2 R.N.s on staff at all times. County doesn't have enough nurses, but has the option to use a registry of medical professionals. Partners are encouraged to share the brochures with medical professionals Disaster Health Care Volunteer Registry.

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These volunteers will be utilized for the drive-thru flu shot clinic coming later in the year.

-Red Cross: don't forget about house fires! Get out immediately – Red Cross recommends 2 minutes to evacuate (keep the Go Bag outside of the building)

-2-1-1 is always a resource for the community, even during an emergency. Serves people who speak various languages.

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Developmental Asset – Core Principle of 40 Assets: Youth as Assets

Thinking of children as providing resources, vs draining resources, will significantly reward them, you, all of us, as we learn how to incorporate these human resources in all areas. This will vary according to the young ones' ages and abilities. At home, at school, or in the community, have them participate in anything that affects them.

At home, use “our” instead of “my”; our home, our car, our yard. Ask them to suggest ways they can contribute; for the youngest you may need to offer a choice of age appropriate tasks. This can work with meals, house cleaning, yard work, expenses, scheduling, planning and preparing for projects, trips, and more. Tasks should be meaningful and clearly a part of the overall effort to the young person. (Easiest to start when children are young; challenging and requiring tact when starting with teen agers.)

Outside of the home, in schools, neighborhoods, and the community we all need to use the same approach. “Our” vs “my”; seek young people’s ideas and comments; allow them to choose how to contribute in a meaningful way. Events, board meetings, school-wide and community-wide issues.
