Happy New Year! I hope you all had some quality time off over the holidays to visit with family and friends. The Superintendent of Schools office staff has several projects that we are excited to roll out in the New Year.

Over the past eight months our office has been developing solutions to promote work-based learning through strengthening the connection between local businesses and schools. During phase one of our Career Pathway Partners program launch, we are populating a directory with businesses and volunteers who would like to come to schools as a guest speaker, offer workplace tours or job shadowing, mentor students, and at the highest level of participation, host student interns. We are anticipating that by this spring, this database will offer a sufficient number of registered businesses and volunteers to share with school teachers, staff and administrators. To get involved, encourage local businesses to register at www.nevco.org/cpp.

We are also working in partnership with UC Davis and Sierra Streams to develop and run a community-based citizen science education program for 3rd-5th grade classes in Nevada County. This will be a four-year project that will have our students collecting data pertaining to community-identified resource management issues (such as forest management for fire and invasive species) at or near their campuses. Teachers will be trained to help lead their classes in this important work.

Our focus on providing professional development in social-emotional learning and trauma informed care will continue with additional trainings in February and March. These will be follow ups to the full-day workshops we offered in September and October of last year on this critical topic for both students and teachers. Please see the additional article in this Nugget on page 3.

Lastly, we are already gearing up for the STEAM Expo to be held on March 28th at the Fairgrounds. We are excited about the additional collaboration with Sierra College and local businesses to make this a "can't miss" event. Bridgeport Bridge Restoration Project Student Art Competition

Nevada County Superintendent of Schools (NCSoS) is pleased to partner with the Bridgeport Restoration Celebration (BRC) Committee to help sponsor two student art competitions in celebra-

tion of the restoration and soon-to-be grand re-opening of the newly restored covered Bridgeport Bridge in Penn Valley. All students across the county are encouraged to participate in this exciting opportunity to celebrate this 158-year-old historical structure. Two challenges for students include an art, painting or collage for students in grades K-12 and the second is a short 1-3 minute YouTube video for students in grades 4-12. Students are challenged to creatively depict the history of the South Yuba River State Park and the Bridgeport Covered Bridge. One winner from every grade level will be presented with a cash award in April and all winners will be given the opportunity to be the first to walk across the bridge when it officially opens at the ribbon cutting ceremony in Fall 2020! All schools in the county have been sent the necessary information for teachers to help students submit their projects by the deadline of 5:00 pm, February 28, 2020. Social Emotional Learning & Trauma-Informed Practices

Put "Your" Oxygen Mask on First...

Nevada County educators learned the importance of this symbolic gesture following day one of a two-day professional development training on trauma-informed practices. In December, two of three authors, Ricky Robertson and Amber Warner, came to facilitate two workshops based upon their book, *Building Resilience in Students Impacted by Adverse Childhood Experiences: A Whole-Staff Approach*. The authors believe that our educational systems must address the support educators receive in order for them to have a positive, informed capacity to support students. When educators can make connections with their own feelings of stress, and what the authors label, 'compassion fatigue' and behaviors in response to student behaviors, they can gain a deeper understanding of possible unintentional biased responses.

Nevada County Superintendent of Schools began the school year with a focus on providing professional development opportunities in social-emotional learning and trauma-informed care. In September and October, the county offered full-day workshops from Ricky Robertson (one of the authors listed above) and Kelly Rizzi from the Shasta County Office of Education. Both are experts on facilitating workshops on trauma-informed practices and building resilience in students and educators surrounding adverse childhood experiences. The workshops discussed the increase in the number of our students having experienced some kind of trauma in their lives such as poverty, divorce, neglect, homelessness, substance abuse, domestic violence and much more. Through various training workshops, educators have had the opportunity to build their capacity and deepen their understanding of the impact of trauma on students' learning and behavior and expand their capacity to foster resilience and success for their students and themselves. These workshops introduce strategies for cultivating self-awareness, growth mindset and self-care.

Educators are reporting the value they receive in spending the time and going deeper into exploring why and how we can support the increased social-emotional and mental health needs of students countywide. We recognize that this important focus transcends beyond just one or two workshops and a one-year plan. As a result, we formed a Community of Practice for Social-Emotional Learning. It is comprised of a mix of approximately 120 educators, school psychologists, administrators, counselors and intervention specialists.

Working in such a collaborative format allows educators to connect with each other, share best practices, and develop multi-tiered strategies to support the behavioral, social-emotional and academic success of all students, especially those impacted by trauma.

Trainings continue to be offered in February and March to complete the work this year with our experts facilitating their work on building resilience, Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) and trauma-informed care and how educators can make whole-school changes to address this growing need. While the training may end technically, the learning just begins when educators leave with action plans, ready to implement strategies within their classrooms, measure their effectiveness and report back on challenges and successes. The Community of Practice cohorts will continue meeting into next year and additional training, as the need arises, will occur as we believe the process of learning never ends and we continue to build resilience right along with our students.

The Power of Music

Music is a joyful and sometimes unusual addition to your parenting. This tool can be used to enhance learning, create a pattern interrupt, or increase communication. Since children are hard-wired for music before language, you can use this to your advantage.

Whether it's a favorite song on Spotify or your singing a song from childhood, music can be used to transition, teach, and calm. Music can set the tone, change the mood, break up an altercation, give direction, calm high energy or bring up low energy – all in a loving and respectful way.

Try the following:

- Pick an easy tune like "Skip to My Lou" – and use it throughout the day to give directions. "Wash, wash, wash your hands..." or "Climb, climb, in your car seat."
- **Musical Concert** Invite all family members to participate. Instruments can range from store-bought shakers to pots and pans.
- **Parade** —Wind through the house as you make music.
- **Music Appreciation Hour** —Listen to a handful of songs from different eras, cultures, instrumentation, or styles.
- **Dance night** Everyone chooses a favorite dance tune. Move the coffee table and dance.
- Lullabies —Singing to your child at bedtime is one of the most important rituals you can give your child. Children are like baby penguins. The sound of their parent's voice is truly magical music to their ears.



Trauma Informed Practices are the link to academic achievement and social/emotional success for students who've experienced toxic stress and trauma. Due to repeated triggering of the fight or flight system, the neurology of these students is different than their grade level counterparts, and taking in new knowledge can often be challenging. Navigating social/emotional situations can also be difficult. Trauma Informed Practices help teachers and students to be better regulated, which decreases behavior issues, and prepares the brain for learning.




Take 5 For Music


